## Brant-Argyle School honours student with new outdoor stage built in her memory

Community invited to help choose a name that honours Danica's joyful spirit

A meaningful vision has taken shape in the schoolyard of Brant-Argyle School, where a new outdoor stage now stands in memory of a young student whose light continues to shine.

The stage was built in honour of Danica deLaroque, a former student remembered for her love of dance, performance and joyful expression. The project was spearheaded by Danica's mother, Toni deLaroque, along with her teachers Sarah Hadfield, Kelly Friesen and Stephanie Loewen.

Nestled behind the school among grassy hills, the structure is more than a performance space — it's a tribute to Danica's vibrant spirit and a lasting gift to the community.

The outdoor space will serve multiple purposes, from student performances and school activities to community events and outdoor classroom use. It also includes a storage area for both performance props and outdoor education gear such as skis and snowshoes

Brant-Argyle School and parent advisory council say the project was made possible through years of planning and the combined efforts of volunteers, local businesses and donors. Funding came from Danica's Village Memorial Fund and Manitoba's

Brant-Argyle School, often called the "Little Green Schoolhouse," is known for its hands-on approach to education and strong ties to nature and community. The new stage is just one part of a broader effort to enhance student life.

Next up, the school's parent council is planning to revitalize the chicken coop, build new garden beds and redesign the playground to replace aging equipment. A 50/50 fundraiser has been launched to support these projects, with tickets available online and a draw scheduled during the school's 79th Annual Spring Tea on May 9.
